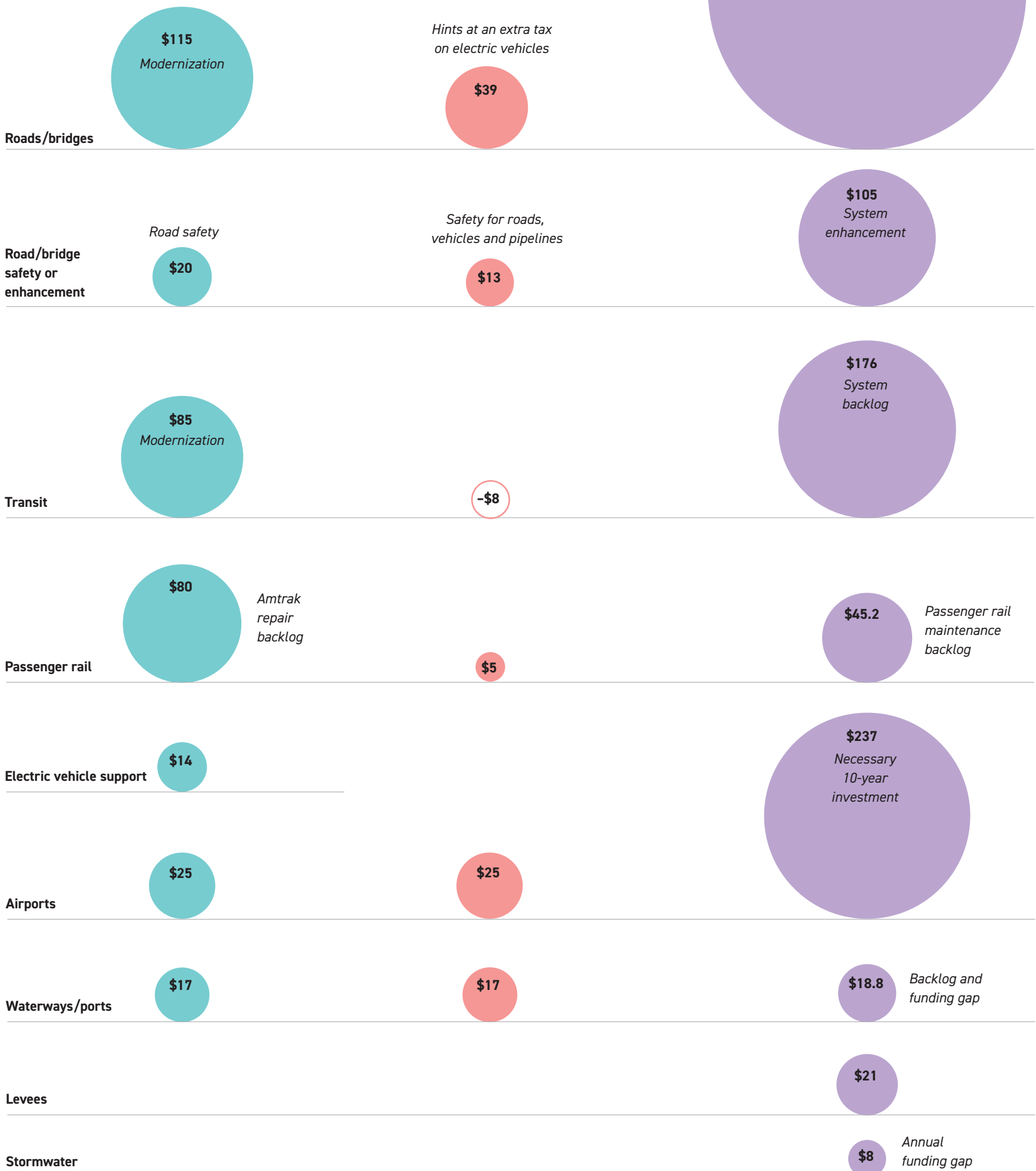
Infrastructure is at the core of President Joe Biden's "American Jobs Plan," which seeks to modernize the nation's infrastructure while supporting clean energy, broadband and modernized housing and manufacturing. The plan also includes job stimulation, investment in rural and disadvantaged communities, and support for home health care workers.

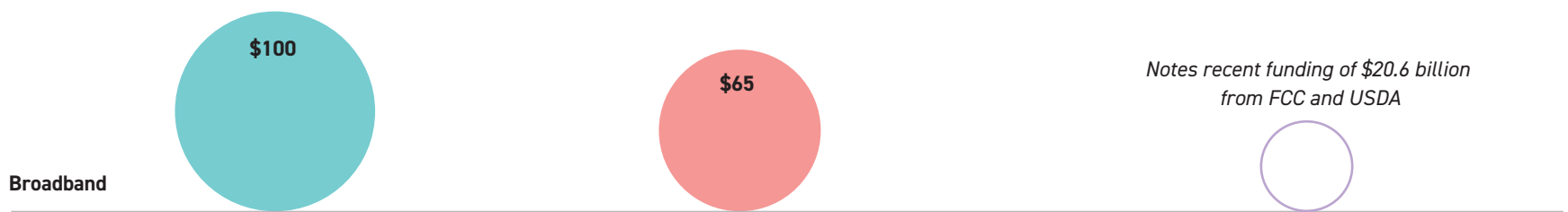
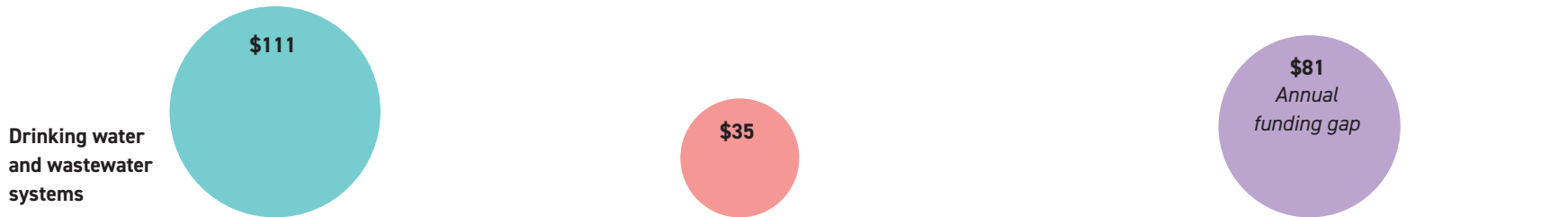
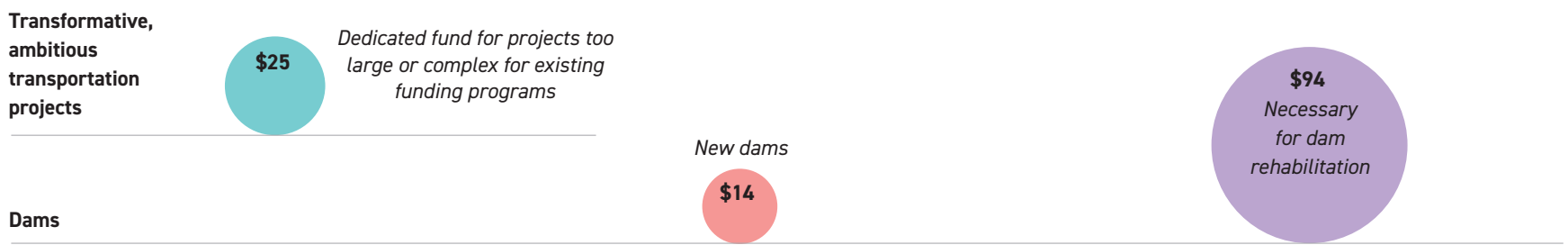

A proposal by Senate Republicans defines infrastructure as including the categories for which it is willing to provide extra funding, listed below. The proposal doesn't mention climate change or clean energy, but says it wants to "bolster our ability to respond to and withstand extreme weather events and natural disasters and protect the environment." The "Republican Roadmap" included figures for some categories that included baseline spending, according to The Washington Post. Only proposed extra funding is included here.
